CORANVIRUS IN BANGLADESH

Here in the UK, whilst we initially grappled with the sudden changes to our day to day lives and whilst we are still living in a complete lockdown to protect and save lives, people around the world particularly in countries where basic infrastructure and living standards remain the lowest in the world, they have had to adapt and cope in a Covid environment. Last March 2020 before countries went into Lockdown, I visited schools in tea gardens in Sylhet Bangladesh.



I support a charity called the Friends of Khasdobir (name of area), who have 14 schools and a sewing workshop, a Food Bank and IT classes for the poorest children and families in the local area of Sylhet. They are entirely dependent on donations raised in the UK by the dedicated trustees to manage the projects. Most of the fathers of the children are Rickshaw Pullers and Labourers so during Lockdown they have no income and no assistance from the state .The charity itself has had to adapt and find ways to fundraise throughout this pandemic. COMMUNITY **KITCHEN** SPRING SHORTBREAD



For shortbread- 50G castor sugar, 125g unsalted butter chopped fresh rosemary 175g self-raising flour For decoration- 6 tbsp. icing sugar 1 lemon juice and zest and sprigs of fresh rosemary

Pre heat Heat oven Combine in a bowl, the sugar and butter and beat to fluffy, add rosemary, pinch of salt and flour. Make dough and roll, cut into 12 round circles. Press them into a muffin tin and bake 8-10 mins. Cool.

Mix icing sugar, lemon juice, and drizzle over shortbread, add lemon zest and sprigs of rosemary on icing. Leave to set for 20 mins and EAT !

UPDATE New Build Project- New Centre Emerging

In the last 5 years we have been extensively consulting with the local community to find out their vison of a new centre. All our group users and local residents have been asking for a centre that is more spacious, energy efficient and equipped to cater for a variety of service users. Our regular users are the Play Group, the Steiner Kindergarten and local community grips who have their own classes from Bollywood dance to prayer sessions.

We have been in consultation with the St Albans District Council and we are delighted that the Council's Cabinet approved and agreed to move on to the next stage of the project and to get involved in drawing up concept designs and costs.

Whilst this is at its early stage the Council will be consulting with the local community and the aim is to have a much-enhanced centre that can better meet the needs of local people and community activities.



Among the proposed features are a main hall, three or more meeting rooms, a children's suite, café, kitchen, toilets and an outdoor space.

Trevor Parsons, Chair of the Fleetville Community Centre Trust, said: "We are delighted to partner the Council to replace the existing building which has done sterling service and is held in great affection by the community over nearly eighty years."
